## Power outages leave college paying price

**December power outages leave damages, electrical issues**

The state's budget crisis isn't the only thing hurting the college financially. December's power interruption added more.

Damages found after electrical failure are adding up to the thousands, according to an inventory assembled by Facilities Management Director Chris Snow.

The inventory of all campus equipment conducted after a power outage to the

campus on Dec. 1 identified a Main Building condenser pump worth \$8,192 and an air handler unit worth \$3,276 as damaged, among multiple damaged equipment totalling to \$13,711.

"I cannot confirm that any of the identified repairs were directly related to electrical outage incurred," Snow wrote in an email. All the damaged equipment listed in the inventory has since been fixed.

With electricity scarce and darkness closing in, the college closed early at 3 p.m. on Dec. 1.

Snow said that the day began

with the college losing power early in the morning, around 9 a.m.

Although many Oklahomans were out of power at that time due to winter weather, Snow said that the OCCC power outage was not remotely related to the snow and ice.

The power outage was due to a fuse on an

Oklahoma General and Electric power line near SW 80th and May Avenue that had become disconnected.

Snow said that OG&E responded within one hour by

especially in reading paper books. Let's take a further look, we will see that spending time reading a real book is far more beneficial and healthier than using an electronic version.

According to a Medical Daily article called “E-Books Are Damaging Your Health: Why We Should All Start Reading Paper Books Again”, the author mentions some differences between a Kindle reader and a paper book reader. He said people who are reading books by using modern devices such as —smartphone or laptop — seem hardly to remember details and content of the book which they just finished compared to traditional readers.

Furthermore, Charles Czeisler, Sleep Medicine professor in Harvard medical school, found out that “the light emitted by most e-readers is shining directly into the eyes of the reader, whereas from a printed book or the original Kindle, the reader is only exposed to reflected light from the pages of the book.” It means the light affection from electronic devices could potentially decrease the sleep’s quality of the readers. In my opinion, paperback readers are able to gain a real feeling of relaxation and enjoyment. People decide to read a book when they want to escape stress and

have a peaceful moment without any interferences in order to refresh their mind. However, if they read with an electronic device, they are easily distracted by many things such as notifications from social networks and apps, messages from friends, surfing websites, advertisements, or emails from work. How could they really relax?

The biggest reason I love reading a paper version is that I could earn valuable feelings which online reading could not bring me. First of all, sometimes when I purchase used books I could find old books which had handwritten notes from previous owners. Those might be a comment about a book's content, a signature or message. For me, those books are witnesses of time and what I want to do with them is to keep writing down my own thoughts in them. Additionally, in my opinion, holding a book, touching it, smelling its paper and marking in it while reading are what make people be real readers. Therefore, I believe sometimes people should stay completely away from modern technology and find an appropriate place to enjoy the feelings of reading a real book.

Every song has its own unique, funky little rhythm, and the falsetto that lead singer Asa Taccone utilizes is mesmerizing, to say the least.

I Hold,” which has such a great lead-in to the song. Unfortunately, according to a Google search, the duo of Taccone and Matthew Compton have not put out any other feature LP’s. The only other albums are an EP, a track by track of *Mondo*, and several others.

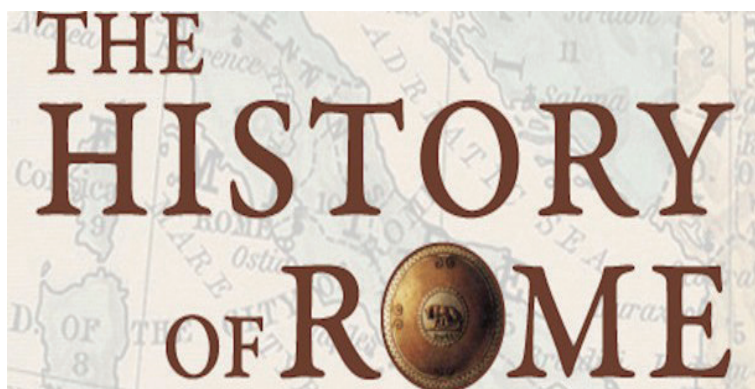
in popular culture that it is often taken as fact, not an invention of Shakespeare.

Each generation retells these stories, and distorting altering them to the needs and tastes of the time. Try comparing the 1960 film “Spartacus” with the more recent “Spartacus” TV series from 2010.

If stories set in Rome have ever made you wonder what the real story was, check out the “History of Rome” podcast. Clocking in over 74 hours this podcast series is massive.

The “History of Rome” begins at the mythical founding of the city by Romulus and Remus, two brothers raised by a wolf. It continues through the era of the Roman Republic, and ends with the fall of the Western Roman Empire.

The “History of Rome” originally aired from 2007



to 2012, and was the first effort of the now veteran podcaster Mike Duncan. Duncan credits his inspiration for the show in part to reading his grandfather’s copy of the classic work of history, “The Decline and Fall

of the Roman Empire,” as a kid. There are a few rough edges in the early episodes, but these smooth out over time, and the podcast is clearly a labor of love.

The “History of Rome” is vast, so virtually every kind of story gets told throughout the podcast. There are plenty of epic battles, heroes, and villains, but there is so much more. The story of Rome sheds light on the origins of a lot of things we think of as modern. Whether it’s politics, law, religion, or art, we owe a debt to the Romans for their contributions.

Listening to the “History of Rome” will make you both more informed and more curious about the world.

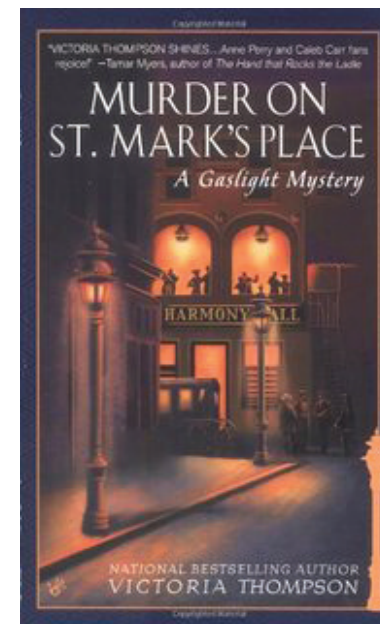
reading in order to find out who is the real killer in the case.

# Woman faced sexual harassment on the sidewalk

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A sexual harassment report, viewing pornographic material, and two medical calls kept campus police officers busy in recent weeks.

Around 9:05 a.m. on Jan. 7, an OCCC female student, 18, went to the Campus Department to file a report about being harassed when she was walking to the campus. Her name was redacted from the report.

Based on the report, she said a Hispanic man wearing a gray shirt and driving a black Ford Mustang kept following her and observing her while she was walking to the Main Building. Then, the suspect rolled down his window and offered her \$100 to tempt her get into his car, she reported.

OCCC police officer Gordon Nelson said in the report the suspect vehicle was

identified on the surveillance camera footage around 7:37 a.m. driving slowly on Faculty Circle. The car stopped at the stop sign for nearly 30 seconds, and then stayed in the intersection where the student just walked away from for nearly 15 seconds. There were no cars around to make the driver stop for that length of time, Nelson reported. The suspect car left the campus at 7:38 a.m.

On Jan. 16, A male visitor, 33, whose name was redacted from the report, was noticed using a campus computer to view pornographic websites around 4:20 p.m. at the OCCC Welcome Center.

Officer Jeremy Bohannon reported he asked the suspect to turn off the computer and go with him to the Campus Police Department.

The suspect had been issued a previous notice to leave campus on June 17, 2015 for using OCCC computers to

look up inappropriate material, Bohannon said.

The suspect was escorted off campus after his photo was taken and one other notice to leave campus was issued, which will be in effect until July 16.

Three medical calls also required attention.

On Jan 8, OCCC officer Patrick Martino was dispatched to a medical call to VPAC 121 at the Visual and Performing Arts Center. He said when he got to the scene, he saw a female student, 19, lying down. The student said she thought she had a heart attack, Martino said.

EMSA came to the scene shortly and transported the student to Presbyterian Hospital.

At 12:11 p.m. Jan 15, there was also a medical report involving to a female

student, 18, who passed out and hit her head on the floor in front of academic advising. The student was conscious when officers David Madden and Jimmie Watts went to the scene. Watts reported that the student said she had not eaten all day and asked whether she could get a snack.

The student then was evaluated by EMSA, but she did not need to be transported to the hospital.

Some information was redacted from the reports under the direction of Marketing and Public Relations Director Cordel Jordan, who said names are redacted "according to OCCCPD Standard Operating Procedures involving information released and information withheld."

"I felt that I could help them...and let

them know that they can make it if they really put forth the effort," Flowers said.

In her Success in College and Life class, Flowers told her students that having values, goals, dreams, and especially discipline, are the key to their success. Helping students establish those is Flowers' duty.

"You have to sacrifice. You have to be committed to what you are doing, and you have to let some things go," said Flowers.

Flowers will be missed by the many former students of hers that, she said, come back to her each semester asking for her to teach a class they are taking.

She said she regularly sees faculty in the hallway that say one of her former students was talking about her to them that day.

Flowers giggles when she thinks what they would say about her.

Flowers said she will spend her retirement continuing to sing in the Ambassador's Choir, an Oklahoma City professional choir. She also directs her church's choir, and enjoys her grandson and family.

# POWER: Electrical issues cost college thousands to repair

coming to return power to the college.

However, at that time, the college began receiving only partial power.

"The issue the college incurred is that one of the three phases of power that feeds the college was not engaged," said Snow.

He said the Main Building and Visual Performing Arts Center ran on two-phase power, though the John Massey Center and the Keith Leftwich Library remained fully powered.

"Being in that given situation is detrimental to three phase power equipment here on campus."

At around 11 a.m. a fire alarm went off in the SEM Center.

Snow said that due to the shortage of power to equipment that requires three phases, an electrical contactor burnt in an electrical room outside of the Anatomy Lab.

"It didn't necessarily catch fire — it got hot, it melted," said Snow.

After 15 minutes the life-safety systems were back on, and students were allowed back in, he said.

When that happened in the SEM center Facilities Management shut down the electrical feed to that area of the building. "We didn't want additional equipment to be affected," said Snow.

"That's why some lights were on, some lights were off."

"Because we hadn't closed the college and because of the safety of everyone involved we chose to continue to keep the Main Building feed active even though we were on that two of three phases, which is extremely detrimental to equipment," Snow said.

Acting Administrative Services Vice President Marlene Shugart said a meeting around 2:30 p.m. that day

involving President Jerry Steward, Acting Executive Vice President Steven Bloomberg, and people from Facilities Management, Academic Affairs, and Marketing and PR concluded that the campus should be closed.

Shugart said the decision was not easy. She said parking lot lights for the evening students are a life-safety issue and not being able to offer such critical student services as advisement, access to the Test Center, and the Math Lab were all factors in their decision.

"Especially being this time of year, with the finals, we only have two weeks left of classes. So there was a lot of thought put into that," Shugart said.

At 2:45 p.m., immediately after the meeting, the Campus Alert Notification system notified OCCC students, faculty and staff that the college would be closing shortly.

About an hour after the decision was made to close the college, OG&E restored all three phases to the college, Snow said.

"Deciding to close the college at three was the right decision regardless of OCCC restoring the power at 3:30," Snow said.

He said that was because there were still difficulties reenergizing the SEM center and the Main Building.

When they went to reenergize the SEM center it immediately shut back down due to a motor in the area that had gone to ground mode, Snow said.

He said it took them another hour to power the SEM center.

Snow said the Main Building was also not able to be restored due to ground-faults until around 7 p.m. that evening.

philosophy of acceptance is missing from today's society.

"Everything he did and said would go completely against what people are doing now," Voth said. "You don't have freedom to be different."

Martin Luther King Jr. advocated for racial equality, justice, and peace for all persons through powerful non-violent marches and civil disobedience, according to thekingcenter.com, a website devoted to his life and work.

As a result of King's work and that of his supporters, Congress eventually passed legislation making it illegal to discriminate based on race in the hiring process and ended segregation, according to the website. King inspired many to take action and "to act on civil rights."

Engineering major Andy Czeropski said this country should be able to rise

up as one while accepting the cultural differences, including religious beliefs, of all people.

Martin Luther King Jr. Day is a day of revolution that symbolizes how far the country has come, said Devona Johnson, diversified studies major.

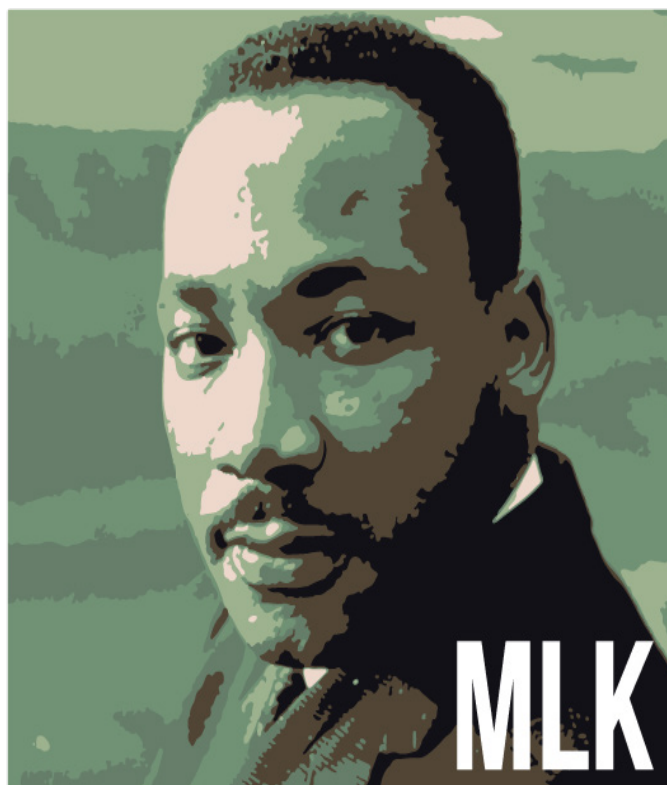
"I have black children and I have a son," Johnson said. "My son's only 5 but I'm still scared for him."

Although society has come a long way, Johnson said, there have been many setbacks.

Allen said one problem society is encountering is that people want their religion, gender, and voice to be respected but are not willing to give it in return. It's a two-way street.

Allen emphasized the importance of continuing to strive for progress.

"There's still a lot of the racial profiling," the professor said. "People want to say it doesn't exist, but I think you



have to have those hard conversations.

"If Dr. King were here, my perspective would be, he would be the one pushing those conversations," Allen said.

King's legacy lives on, according to thekingcenter.org. He was the youngest to receive the Nobel Peace Prize and his "I Have a Dream" speech is one of "the most revered orations."

# Struggle to student: new horizons for local artist

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At one time or another, everyone has been given a second chance. A chance to retake a test, to reconcile with a friend, or to undo a mistake made with a boss. For Isaiah Garcia, a second chance was the difference between spending the better years of his life in prison or taking the opportunity to change his life.

Garcia, 30, is a business management student at OCCC whose path to college has included some detours.

"I just got out of prison two years ago," said Garcia. Garcia said he chose to be a college student at OCCC because it's been difficult to find a good job with his criminal record so getting an education is vital to turning his life around.

One of his professors described Garcia as an excellent student.

"He was one of my best students last semester as far as really exhibiting a genuine concern for the course and for improving his position in life. And for rising above his circumstances," said English Professor Lynette Bloomberg. "We talked about his background, he wrote about his background."

"He worked really hard and performed very well in class with other students. I see a very promising future ahead of him."

Garcia's business goal is to one day have his own sports bar in Oklahoma City with a music feel, combining his love of music with his knowledge of the hospitality industry.

If I wasn't here [OCCC] then I would be in jail," Garcia said.

He grew up in south Oklahoma City where he currently lives. Garcia said he didn't have much growing up. Although his parents were present when he was younger, Garcia said he was always with his friends. His friends were there to help him and showed him love, but those friends also showed him the lifestyle that got him into trouble, he said.

"The first time I got shot at was in seventh grade," Garcia said. Garcia said he was involved in robberies and a high speed chase both as a juvenile.

Big trouble came for Garcia five years ago when he was involved in an altercation at a strip club in Oklahoma City where shots were fired. Fortunately, no injuries or deaths occurred. But police and prosecutors identified him as part of a criminal element they

wanted off the street and in prison. With the different charges against him and his already lengthy record, Garcia said he was expecting a split 40 year sentence, 20 years in prison and 20 years probation.

The decision to start making positive changes in his life came while Garcia was awaiting his sentencing while at the Oklahoma County Jail. Garcia said he prayed he would get a good deal, promised to change his ways, and keep his word. During his time in jail, Garcia knew he had to let the judge know his side of the story. Up until this point, Garcia said, he had not testified or had any chance to talk. Garcia decided to send the judge a four-page letter taking responsibility for his actions.

While waiting in court the day of his guilty plea and sentencing, Garcia observed another inmate who got his sentence right before Garcia, an inmate with fewer violent crimes who received a life sentence. Garcia admits he got nervous while he waited. The judge asked Garcia if the content of the letter was all true, and Garcia said yes. A second chance for Garcia came when the judge sentenced him to only five years in prison but with one condition: the judge told Garcia that if he ever saw him again, even for the smallest offense, he was done. At the time Garcia was 25 years old.

Garcia said he was in three prisons while he served his time. He was moved to Carver Transitional Center in Oklahoma City where he was able to get work experience before his release. Garcia attended various programs while in prison including anger management and drug counseling. He is taking his second chance seriously so when he feels stressed or upset, he said he turns to music as his outlet, instead of making bad decisions that could lead him back to his old ways.

Garcia first started turning to music at the age of 19. Music was an outlet for all the anger he was feeling inside. He used his personal experiences to write his own lyrics. Garcia said he would meet up with a friend with a laptop, go to a cheap hotel, and begin creating music. Garcia would write his own lyrics and sing. It was a hobby for Garcia and a way to express his emotions. A new opportunity arose in October 2015 when Garcia said he met a more experienced sound engineer at a Halloween party. Garcia said the guy knows everything about the technical side of making music and has a music studio.

He goes to the music studio and records once a month now that spring semester is underway, he said.

Garcia has three songs recorded available to listen online, all with different beats that give the hip hop feel.

Garcia takes time writing then goes into the studio.

He said he is excited to be working with a more professional engineer. Garcia admits that before, when he tried handling the technical side of music, his laptop would get a new virus.

"You create your own reality, think about it and it comes into existence," Garcia said about meeting the experienced engineer.

Garcia wants others to listen to his music and pay attention to what's happening in the world. His music concept revolves different religions and world issues. Garcia studied religions by reading books while in prison. Garcia said he would like to hear his music played on the radio someday but after spending a total of seven years behind bars, his main focus right now is getting an education. Garcia also works full-time for a furniture manufacturing company.

He has seven college classes under his belt, all with passing grades. By the end of this semester, he should have four more class, making him a full-fledged sophomore.
